
While earning a nursing degree at the


Recently the Pikes Peak Opera League was invited to be the main program at Garden of the Gods Rotary Club. What an opportunity to talk about why we

Sold out! Magic words in the theater, to retailers, and to your Jam Committee.

In fact, a telephone call from Barbara Shepard, now living in Tucson, sent Nancy back to the stove to cook up an absolutely final half batch of jam so six jars could be sent to her. Only for Barbara (and a few of you) would this happen. Barbara was a long time member of the Opera League and year after year, she would quietly donate money to help keep the jam cost down.

Many others assisted in keeping the cost down. Your Jam Committee wants to especially thank Mary Margaret Brummeler, who again donated eight cases of jars. Wendy Wood, Deanna Lyons, Judy Warren, Helene Knapp and Terry Thatcher returned their multiples of 'empties,' and various others quietly slipped one or two 'empties' into my ever-present tote bag at meetings to help the cost cause. Thank you to all. A quick glance at the price tag for a dozen jars will reveal what a cost saving these returned jars are.

Not to be outdone, Gloria Wendt and Lu Benning donated the sugar. While Lesly Blend and Doris Farmer covered the cost of the raspberries, the remaining sugar, lids and other ingredients.

In short, thanks to individual member generosity, all jam expenses were covered except for \$12.99 for labels that are still floating around the atmosphere waiting to be delivered. (Have been hard on their trail since October).

Thanks to long-time friend Pat Gentile who supplies over ninety percent of our rhubarb from his rhubarb patch year after year. Thanks also to Kay MacEnulty, Helene Knapp and myself for the rest.

It takes five and a half pounds of rhubarb per batch (sometimes we slip in an extra cup or two) so, next spring, when rhubarb is in the stores, glance at the price per pound and say a special "thank you" to our rhubarb providers. Another key person to mention is my friend Marlene Bonar who has opened her freezer to store the rhubarb and raspberries for us. Next year, I'll be looking for

some of your freezers to provide space as Marlene is moving into an apartment.

Finally, thank you to all our official opera jam devotees, who faithfully purchase the product of our fundraiser. Many thanks to Lu Benning, Kay MacEnulty and Nancy Daly for making the jam. By the way, we are looking for another member of our committee, especially to handle the sales and distribution at meetings. Interested? Let Nancy or Lu or Kay know.

All our efforts resulted in raising \$822.69 after expenses. Of this \$740.44 will go into the General Fund and \$82.25 into the Rasor Investment Fund (RIF). So, Rhubarbs and Raspberries to all!

P.S. Barbara Shepard wanted me to pass on her greetings to all. She is still sad about her abrupt departure that left her no time to say "Goodbye." Amy Maples' Grand Success as Gilda in Rigoletto

Many of you ask me quite often how a particular Opera Theatre of the Rockies' performer is doing. So I thought I would share with you the recent success of our own Amy Maples,

soprano. When I say 'our own' I mean it literally, as she was one of Pikes Peak Opera League's 2014 Career Grant recipients. You may also remember Amy's touching portrayal of Tuptim in Opera Theatre's The King and I that same

Well, this past October, Amy sang the role of Gilda in Giuseppe Verdi's *Rigoletto* in North Carolina with

Piedmont Opera. In a review in *Voix des Arts*, Joseph Newsome described Amy as a singer "who met every technical challenge unflinchingly...and commanded the audience's sympathy with gestures and actions of emotional meaning." He said also that she

showed "starlit articulation", and created "an atmosphere of concentrated emotion as she unfurled a velvety ribbon of tone."

The critic went on to say that Amy was "heartbreakingly tender" in scenes with her

stage father, and perforher mance of Gilda's famed aria Caro nome, delivering "an intimate reverie that was distinguished with sparkling trills and crystalline high notes". He noted that "Maples was inspired to vocalism of impec-cable poise and time-stopping expressivity" and "the pathos of her phrasing in the final act was gripping.'

We are so proud of you.


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The ABC's of Opera An Ongoing Guide to the Best Recordings — Evgeny Onegin —

When the letter "E" came around in my ongoing al-

phabetical guide to opera recordings, at first I thought, "There aren't any!" But a little more thinking, as well as referencing a couple of published lists, turned up quite a few: Verdi's Ernani, Mozart's Die Entführung aus dem Serail, and Richard Strauss' Elektra for starters. But as I've already considered operas by Verdi and Mozart, and as I am planning



And this is a particularly felicitous choice for me, as the opera happens to be one of my favorites. Not to be found here are the grand emotional outcries of Verdi or Puccini, nor the orchestral richness of Wagner or Strauss; but rather, as the composer called his work, a sequence of "lyrical scenes" of honest and sincere feeling. The opera had its premiere in 1879, with a cast of students at the Moscow University, followed by its first professional production at the Bolshoi Theater two years later. In spite of its success, the opera was slow to find an international audience, although it was staged in Prague in 1888, and in Hamburg in 1892, under the direction of Gustav Mahler. The United States premiere took place

at the Metropolitan Opera on March 24, 1920, and today Onegin is regu-

larly produced around the

As far as I've been able to discover, there have only been seven official recordings of the opera, the first three from 1936, 1948 and 1956, all with stars of the Bolshoi Opera. Later stereo recordings include those conducted by Georg Solti (1974), James Levine (1987),and Semyon Bychkov (1993), with the Chandos label contribut-

ing another in their series of Opera In English in 1992.

Of these, the Decca recording with Georg Solti made quite a splash when it came out, as it marked several firsts: a non-Russian cast, a recording in stereo, a major conductor leading an international cast, and a recording by a major label. And the recording has well stood the test of time, with a cast that includes Bernd Weikl (Onegin), Stuart Burrows (Lensky), Teresa Kubiak (Tatyana), Julia Hamari (Olga), and Nicolai Ghiaurov (Gremin). This remained the recording of choice for several years, as the Russian recordings were only intermittently available in the West, and when it appeared on CD in 1987, I quickly added it to my collection. When the Deutsche Grammophon recording led by James Levine was issued the same year, it

Solti recording. Featuring another international cast including Thomas Allen (Onegin), Neil Shicoff (Lensky), Mirella Freni (Tatyana), Anne Sofie von Otter (Olga), and Paata Burchuladze (Gremin), this recording revealed a sensitivity and lyricism that now became apparent was lacking somewhat in Solti's typically urgent, dramatic reading. I added this recording of Onegin to my library and was perfectly happy with the two – that is until the next recording found its way into the

For Philips in 1993, Russian conductor Semyon Bychkov led a performance that featured three Russian singers (Dmitri Hvorostovsky (Onegin), Olga Borodina (Olga), and Alexander Anisimov (Gremin)), a well-established and previously recorded Lensky in Neil Shicoff, and a fine Tatyana in Nuccia Focile. Of course I added this recording to my library, and it is now my preferred recording of the work.

In stereo, that is. If you want the real thrill and frisson of an entirely Russian cast in this most Russian of operas, you can't beat the 1956 recording on Russian Melodiya featuring Evgeny Belov (Onegin), Sergey Lemeshev (Lensky), a young Galina Vishnevskaya (Tatyana), Larissa Avdeyeva (Olga), and Ivan Petrov (Gremin), with the Bolshoi Theater Orchestra and Chorus conducted by Boris Khaikin. I was never so happy as when I was able to add this recording to my library as

I told you that Evgeny Onegin is one of my favorite operas!

Pikes Peak Opera League continues to maintain a strong financial position. Our Do-Nothing

Campaign donations totaled \$3,495 at the end of November and jam sales totaled \$635. The checking account had a balance of \$18,931. Committed funds of \$11,891 reduced this resulting amount available funds of \$7,040. The raffle account had an ending balance of \$1,688 and the saving account balance was \$201.



Because of the healthy checking account balance, the board was pleased to approve a \$5,000 dona-

tion to Opera Theatre of the Rockies. The check was presented at the December meeting. It is not too late to donate to the Do-Nothing campaign. All donations made to the Do-Nothing Fundraiser will directly support opera in the Pikes Peak region. Your generosity to the Do-Nothing campaign is so appreciated.

Pikes Peak Opera League announces its fourth annual Young Voice Competition.

The Competition is an exciting opportunity for young high school singers throughout southern Colorado to gain experience in the vocal arts, the audition process and concert performance. Teams of Preliminary and Finals Judges are made up of opera performers, directors, conductors and other well-known music professionals. Monetary awards will be given to the top three singers from the Finalists chosen.

Applications are due no later than Friday, February 19, 2016. Singers are required to prepare three contrasting songs or arias. The Preliminary Auditions are held on March 12, and are closed to the public. We do, however, invite the public to attend the Master Class for Finalists to be held on Sunday, April 3 at First United Methodist Church, 420 North Nevada, in Colorado Springs. The Final Auditions will be held in the form of a Recital open to the public on Friday evening, April 15 at 7 pm at Packard Hall, at Colorado College.

Winners will be announced at the end of the evening, with a dessert reception to follow. Visit *pikespeakoperaleague*. *org* for more details. Please share this program information with your friends and music contacts. We encourage more young applicants to apply this year. It is a wonderful effort that the League offers our community.
